Organizational Highlights 2023-24

- Geographic Reach: 75 villages across Pune district
- School Engagement: 21 schools, 2,850 students
- Community Impact: 4,136 direct community members reached
- Women Empowered: 3,000+ trained in vocational skills
- Youth Skilling: 2,500+ youth engaged in technical and career education
- **Green Footprint:** 3,500 trees planted across program areas

1. Skilling through Schooling: Preparing Students for Tomorrow

Implemented in 10 secondary schools, engaging 600+ students. The program blended academics with vocational exposure through skill workshops and career guidance events, enabling early career clarity.





2. Youth Skill Development: Training for Livelihoods

At our 3 skill centers 450 rural youth were trained in tailoring, computer literacy, electrical work, and beauty services.

• **Exposure visits** and **soft-skill sessions** helped bridge the gap between training and employment.

3. Women Empowerment: Strengthening Voices and Livelihoods

- 1,200+ women trained in tailoring, food processing, and handicrafts.
- 15 women-led micro-enterprises emerged, generating sustainable livelihoods.
- SHGs trained in financial literacy, digital banking, and leadership.
- Linkages with banks, schemes, and markets improved sustainability.

4. Community & Farmer Development: Building Resilience

- 300+ farmers trained in organic and sustainable practices.
- Support included improved seeds, technical guidance, and market linkages.
- 2,500+ trees planted with schools and farmers, enhancing environmental resilience.

5. Organic Kitchen Garden Project: Nutrition, Inclusion & Sustainability

Supported by Cummins India Foundation at Poona Blind School & Home for Blind Girls.

- Produced fresh, chemical-free vegetables over 195 days.
- Improved diet diversity and reduced food costs.
- Staff and students actively participated in gardening.
- Introduced composting and water conservation practices.

This initiative blended **nutrition**, **sustainability**, **and inclusion**—becoming a therapeutic and learning space for visually impaired children.

6. Corporate Engagement for Social Good: Partnership with Cummins India Ltd.

- **1,450 Cummins employees** engaged through year-round volunteering at Poona Blind School, Kothrud.
- **Activities:** Cultural events, cleanliness drives, classroom reading, painting, kitchen garden support, and donations of accessible materials.
- The initiative fostered empathy among employees and strengthened grassroots support.
